Prior to Kenergy's annual membership meeting on June 10, 2025, three individuals will be elected to represent Districts 1 (Lyon, Caldwell and Hopkins counties, excluding members on the east side of Highway 109 in Hopkins County), 3 (Webster and Hopkins counties, excluding members on the west side of Highway 109 in Hopkins County) and 5 (all of east

Henderson County, excluding members located on the west side of the Pennyrile Parkway and the northern merging run of Highway 41).

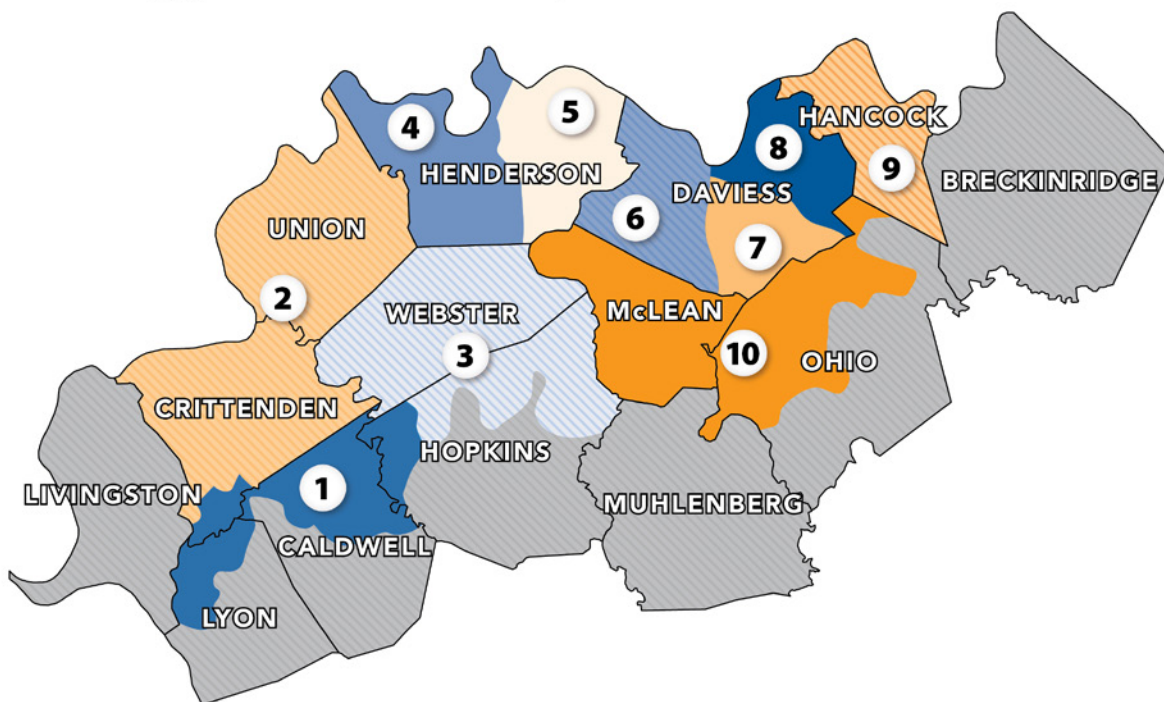
A district director must be a member of the cooperative and must reside in the district he or she represents.

Any 15 or more members may make nominations of eligible persons for district director. Such nominations shall be

by signed written petition and must be submitted to the cooperative by 4 p.m. on February 24, 2025. Only members eligible to vote in a district are authorized to sign a petition nominating a member from that district.

Hearth and home

Fireplaces create a room-heating challenge

If you turn down the thermostat and gather around a crackling wood fire to keep warm on chilly winter evenings, you could send your heating bill soaring.

Because you have to open the damper to let smoke escape through the chimney, you're sending heated air from your home up the chute with it. If you must use a wood-burning fireplace, try these tips to reduce your home's exposure to air leaks.

1. Have your fireplace inspected and your chimney cleaned, both for safety and for energy efficiency. If you haven't used your fireplace since last winter, a professional cleaning by a certified chimney sweep will remove any debris and soot that may have built up.
2. Add an airtight fireplace insert, like a glass door or fireplace cover. They fit tightly around the opening and



prevent heat loss when you're not burning wood in the fireplace.

3. Use dry firewood. Wet wood doesn't burn as hot, so you have to add more wood over a shorter time. Wet wood also creates more creosote, which can stick to the glass door and the flue—and cause a fire in the flue.
4. Install a ceiling fan and set the blades to spin in reverse. The fan can help distribute the heat generated by the fireplace around the room.

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PREPARING

for winter storms

This time of year, dangerous conditions could confine families to their homes for days at a time. It's never too early to begin planning and preparing your home for the winter months.

Kentucky winters can include heavy snows, freezing rain and ice storms—sometimes all in one day. All of those forms of winter weather can create electrical hazards.

Your electric co-op recommends keeping a storm preparedness kit fully stocked. The basic supplies in this kit should include:

- Bottled water
- Nonperishable food
- Emergency blankets
- First aid kit/medicine
- Flashlight
- Battery-operated or hand-crank radio
- Extra batteries
- Toiletries
